RESOLUTION CONCERNING DISCONTINUANCE OF A PORTION OF THE UNIMPROVED RIGHT-OF-WAY OF S. BARLAND AVENUE AND UNIMPROVED PUBLIC ALLEYS NORTH AND SOUTH OF E. HOWARD AVENUE IN THE CITY OF ST. FRANCIS

WHEREAS, Wis. Stat. § 62.11(5) provides, in pertinent part, that the Common Council shall have the management and control of the city property, finances, highways, navigable waters, and the public service, and shall have power to act for the government and good order of the city, for its commercial benefit, and for the health, safety, and welfare of the public"; and

WHEREAS, Wis. Stat. § 66.1003 sets forth the procedures for discontinuing all or any part of a road or street; and

WHEREAS, the Planning Commission has recommended vacation of a portion of the Unimproved S. Barland Avenue right-of-way north and south of E. Howard Avenue and the Unimproved Public Alley right-of-way north and south of E. Howard Avenue legally described and depicted in Exhibit A and Exhibit B attached hereto and incorporated by reference; and

WHEREAS, no landlocked parcel will be created by the proposed vacation; and

WHEREAS, record notice of the introduction of this Resolution was recorded by the City Clerk with the Register of Deeds for Milwaukee County; and

WHEREAS, the Plan Commission, at a meeting held on August 24, 2016 has recommended that the Common Council approve the vacation of the right-of-ways described and depicted in Exhibit A and Exhibit B; and

WHEREAS, following introduction of this Resolution, the Common Council scheduled a public hearing concerning the discontinuation of a portion of the Unimproved S. Barland Avenue right-of-way north and south of E. Howard Avenue and the Unimproved Public Alley right-of-way north and south of E. Howard Avenue not less than forty (40) days after such introduction; and

WHEREAS, a public hearing concerning this matter was duly conducted by the Common Council on October 18, 2016 and

WHEREAS, notice of said public hearing was duly provided to the public and to the owners of the real property adjacent to that portion of the Unimproved S. Barland Avenue right-of-way north and south of E. Howard Avenue and the Unimproved Public Alley right-of-way north and south of E. Howard Avenue for which discontinuation is contemplated in the manner provided in Wis. Stat. §§ 66.1003(4)(b) and (8); and

WHEREAS, the Common Council has duly considered the recommendations of the Planning Commission, City Engineer, and any and all information received in the course of the public hearing concerning this matter;

NOW, THEREFORE, the Common Council of the City of St. Francis hereby ordains as follows:

IT IS HEREBY RESOLVED that:

1. The Common Council hereby declares that the public interest requires the vacation of the portion of the Unimproved S. Barland Avenue right-of-way north and south of E. Howard Avenue and the Unimproved Public Alley right-of-way north and south of E. Howard Avenue legally described and depicted in the attached Exhibit A and Exhibit B.
2. That portion of the Unimproved S. Barland Avenue right-of-way north and south of E. Howard Avenue and the Unimproved Public Alley right-of-way north and south of E. Howard Avenue depicted and described in the legal description and map attached hereto and incorporated by reference as Exhibit A and Exhibit B is hereby DISCONTINUED pursuant to Wis. Stat. § 66.1003;
3. The City Clerk shall record a certified copy of this Resolution together with the attached Exhibit A and Exhibit B with the Milwaukee County Register of Deeds

2017 Administrator's Budget Update

City Administrator Johnsrud stated the 2017 Administrator Budget as presented October 4, 2016 remained the same and had no changes. He stated the state transportation aids were \$42,340 more than last year giving us a surplus. Health Insurance premiums have come in with an increase of 5%, less than anticipated giving the city a surplus also.

Municipal Court is requesting changing the Court Clerk position to full-time, she would then cross train another employee to be her backup. Questions arose regarding health insurance and other benefits for this position. City Administrator stated he would like to have more cross training in departments.

Mayor request she not receive an increase in her expense allowance, follow up discussion pertaining to an increase in expense allowance for the Alderpersons took place.

Alderperson Wattawa would like to discuss the court budget more, requesting a Finance meeting be scheduled on October 25, 2016 at 5:00 p.m.

2017 Capital Budget

City Administrator Johnsrud presented the 5 year capital budget plan showing dollar amounts for each project and stated the information came from the Department heads. He discussed items for each department for the 2017 Capital Budget and the fund source.

Administrator:

Market update regarding Assessments and an Impact Fee Study with funds from Capital Reserves.

Municipal Court:

TIPSS software and debt collection with funds from the 2017 Capital levy.

Fire Department:

Building Security, Technology Upgrades, Radio Upgrades, Communications – Milwaukee County, Hose/Equipment Replacement with funds from Capital Reserves; and Engine 1 Replacement with funds from 2017 Capital levy.

Police Department:

Tactical Equipment, Technology Upgrades, Radios and Equipment with funds from Capital Reserves; and Patrol Cars from 2017 Capital levy.

Sweeper Upgrade and Catch Basin Repairs with funds from Storm Sewer Reserves.

TID 4:

Market Update – Assessment and Impact Fee Study from TID #4 Cash.

TID 5:

Market Update – Assessment and Impact Fee Study from TID #5 Cash.

City Administrator Johnsrud discussed the 5 year Capital Budget 2017 – 2021. He presented information regarding the need to create a policy on how we fund Capital funding and possibility of creating a debt service plan regarding road improvements. We have a limit of \$255,615 for the 2017 Capital levy and decisions will need to be made by departments on their capital spending. State does not allow an increase in the levy but will allow an increase in debt service.

2318 East Eden Place Sewer Bill

Correspondence with figure analysis were presented regarding a 2016 sewer bill in the amount of \$2413.61 compared to past usage and billing. The correspondence supported a faulty meter resulting in an inaccurate reading. Discussion revolved around creating a policy regarding these type of occurrences.

Moved by Alderperson Tutaj, seconded by Alderperson McSweeney to recommend an adjustment to concur with the 2015 usage and reduce the sewer billing to \$346.18. Motion carried.

Chairman McSweeney called the meeting to order at 5:00 p.m.

Review of the 2017 Operating Budget:

City Administrator Johnsrud reviewed with the Committee the changes made to the budget since the last Finance Committee meeting. He stated that Highway Aids and Connecting Street Aids increased; the wages/benefits section for the Municipal Court changed to reflect the Court Clerk position being full time; health insurance decreased for all departments as the renewal rate came in at 5% instead of the 7% that was budgeted; and changes were made reflecting the union contracts. Over all the net effect is a surplus of \$19,532. The line item for Police Department Gas and Oil was increased to \$40,000 and Building Permits were decreased to \$104,168. These changes show a balanced budget of \$11,017,360 which is a .0005% increase over 2016.

2017 Capital Fund Budget:

City Administrator Johnsrud stated that the only change from the previous budget presented is the addition of \$40,000 of CDBG revenue which is being transferred to the Library Fund for the repaving of the parking lot. This had been scheduled to be done in 2016, but the CDBG funds weren't available until 2017.

Discussion was held regarding holding the budget to a 0% increase even though the increase is only \$422. The Committee felt that this would be a positive sign to send to the citizens.

Moved by Alderman Tutaj, seconded by Alderwoman Schandel to recommend that the 2017 City of St. Francis Budget be set for Public Hearing on November 29, 2016 and that the budget will reflect a 0% increase. Motion carried.

A motion was made by Commissioner Stemwell, seconded by Commissioner Buechel to approve the minutes of the July 27, 2016 meeting. Motion carried.

3. Public Comment

Mayor St. Marie-Carls requested that the new member of the Planning Commission Darin Frerichs introduce himself to the Commission which he did.

Alderwoman Schandel stated that she noticed that the Martial Arts studio sign was up and the MetroPCS sign was down. She also commented on the disability parking. She further commented that the Council made a change in the amount of right-of-way that was proposed to be vacated and deleted on E. Martin Lane. The right-of-way that is proposed for vacation and deletion is 12 feet instead of 15 feet. She just did not want anyone to be confused.

4. Discussion and Possible Action

A. St. Francis Animal Hospital – Site Plans and Architectural Plans

Mayor St. Marie-Carls stated that representatives from the St. Francis Animal Hospital were in attendance to present the revisions to the project. Ms. Cronin stated that there had been a number of changes based upon the comments from the last review. She believes the changes were for the positive. They have even tried to address the concerns from the public hearing. There were a number of questions regarding adequate parking, and use of the interior space. City Engineer Dejewski presented the review letter to the Commission. She and Building Inspector Vretenar both concur that while some of the items have not been submitted such as the grading plan and photometric plan, that the concept of the building and site layout were satisfactory and the outstanding items could be addressed by staff. A motion was made by Commissioner Stemwell, seconded by Commissioner Grubanowitch to recommend to the Common Council approval of the site layout and architectural plans contingent upon the items listed in the letter from the City Engineer being addressed satisfactorily. Motion carried.

A motion was made by Commissioner Grubanowitch, seconded by Commissioner Kiepczynski to suspend the agenda and move to item 4B2a-b. Motion carried.

B. Vacation and Deletion of City Right-of-Way

2. Unimproved Right-of-Way North and South of E. Howard Avenue

a. Unimproved S. Barland Avenue from E. Howard Avenue to a point approximately 120 feet north of E. Howard Avenue

b. Unimproved S. Barland Avenue from E. Howard Avenue to a point approximately 120 feet south of E. Howard Avenue

c. Unimproved Public Alley approximately 120 feet north of E. Howard Avenue from Unimproved S. Barland Avenue west approximately 430 feet

d. Unimproved Public Alley approximately 120 south of E. Howard Avenue from Unimproved S. Barland Avenue west approximately 400 feet

City Engineer Dejewski gave an overview of the issue stating that these streets need to be vacated and deleted so that a CSM can be created to overwrite the excising subdivision so that the right-of-way for E. Howard Avenue can be dedicated. A motion was made by Commissioner Buechel, seconded by Commissioner Kiepczynski to recommend to the Common Council to approve the vacation and deletion and to schedule the public hearing. Motion carried.

B. Vacation and Deletion of City Right-of-Way

1. South Side of E. Marin Lane between S. Kirkwood Avenue and S. Lake Drive

Mayor St. Marie-Carls informed the Commission that the E. Martin Lane reconstruction project would not be moving forward. One issue that came forward during the design process is that there appears to be some excess right-of-way along E. Martin Lane from when it was E. Howard Avenue. City Engineer Dejewski stated that during the Board of Public Works meeting this issue came forward. At that time, she was asked how much right-of-way could be released. Without having done a lot of research, she stated that she indicated to the Board of Public Works 15 feet. Upon further review, it would appear more appropriate to only vacate and delete 12 feet of right-of-way so that there would be enough right-of-way if a future Council would want to install sidewalk on the south side of the street.

There was discussion on the merits of vacating 12 feet and 15 feet or not vacating or deleting any right-of-way. Also discussed was the encroachment of the abutting property owners into the existing right-of-way. A motion was made by Commissioner Kiepczynski, seconded by Commissioner Grubanowitch to recommend to the Common Council to vacate and delete 12 feet of the southern right-of-way of E. Martin Lane and to have the City Attorney and City Engineer proceed with the proper notifications. Motion carried.

C. Development Update

1. Mandel Group Proposed Development

Mayor St. Marie-Carls stated that she and City Administrator Johnsrud had met with Ian of the Mandel Group. They are working on a site plan and they discussed different options. There is nothing final yet. It will be another 4-5 months before anything is brought forward. Commissioner Kiepczynski stated that he had requested that Mr. Monnat come to this meeting and Mr. Monnat had indicated that he would. Mayor St. Marie-Carls stated that since there were no new plans, she offered to update the Commission instead. No action was taken on this item.

C. Development Update

2. Bear Development

Mayor St. Marie-Carls stated that she and City Administrator Johnsrud met with SR Mills of Bear Development. They also are moving forward with their preliminary site plan and there has been no phasing of the plan yet. They are planning on closing on the property in October. The final site plan should be ready in early 2017 with a start in spring of 2017. They are anticipating a 3-5 year build-out time frame. Ms. Carter-Dryer stated that she had heard the ground breaking was supposed to be last spring and the tower still has not come down. The Commission stated that it was moving forward and asked for her patience. Mayor St. Marie-Carls stated that Thomson will take down the towers and the City Administrator will keep this issue as a priority.

C. Development Update

3. Gallacher Proposed Development

Mayor St. Marie-Carls stated that the council took no action on the office so the offer dies. The Council wanted more retail and self-storage was not in the comprehensive plan. There was no action taken on this item.

5. Unfinished Business

A. 4235 S. Nicholson Avenue – RFP Review

Mayor St. Marie-Carls stated that Brinshore has proposed a WHEDA tax credit development. The goal is to have the Council discuss the proposal. City Administrator added that there have been no changes in the proposal or the amount of TIF money they are requesting. No action was taken on this item.

5. Unfinished Business

B. Keren Properties Site – 2300 E. Layton Avenue

Mayor St. Marie-Carls stated that City Administrator Johnsrud had not had an opportunity to be fully informed of the issues with the project and that is why no representatives from Keren were at the meeting. There was discussion on the parking concern. The property owner had indicated that he would install signage in the parking lot to designate spaces for each tenant as well as obtain a cost estimate for the parking lot on his adjacent lot. Upon inspection, it was reported that some of the parking signs had been installed and he was seen measuring the site. No action was taken on this item.

6. Adjourn

A motion was made by Commissioner Buechel, seconded by Commissioner Kiepczynski to adjourn. Motion carried. Meeting adjourned at 8:32pm.

RESOLUTION PROVIDING FOR THE SALE OF
\$3,190,000 GENERAL OBLIGATION REFUNDING BONDS, SERIES 2016A

WHEREAS, the City of St. Francis, Milwaukee County, Wisconsin (the "City") is presently in need of approximately \$3,190,000 for the public purpose of refunding obligations of the City, including interest on them, specifically, the obligations of the City with respect to the Community Development Lease Revenue Bonds, dated December 28, 2007, issued by the City's Community Development Authority; and

WHEREAS it is desirable to borrow said funds through the issuance of general obligation refunding bonds pursuant to Section 67.04, Wisconsin Statutes;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that:

Section 1. The Bonds. The City shall issue its General Obligation Refunding Bonds, Series 2016A, in the amount of approximately \$3,190,000 (the "Bonds") for the purpose above specified.

Section 2. Sale of Bonds. The Common Council hereby authorizes and directs that the Bonds be offered for public sale. At a subsequent meeting, the Common Council shall consider such bids for the Bonds as may have been received and take action thereon.

Section 3. Notice of Sale. The City Clerk (in consultation with the City's financial advisor, Ehlers & Associates, Inc. ("Ehlers")) is hereby authorized and directed to cause the sale of the Bonds to be publicized at such times and in such manner as the City Clerk may determine and to cause copies of a complete, official Notice of Sale and other pertinent data to be forwarded to interested bidders as the City Clerk may determine.

Section 4. Official Statement. The City Clerk (in consultation with Ehlers) shall also cause an Official Statement to be prepared and distributed. The appropriate City officials shall determine when the Official Statement is final for purposes of Securities and Exchange Commission Rule 15c2-12 and shall certify said Statement, such certification to constitute full authorization of such Statement under this resolution.

Section 5. Award of the Bonds. Following receipt of bids for the Bonds, the Common Council shall consider taking further action to provide the details of the Bonds; to award the Bonds to the lowest responsible bidder therefor; and to levy a direct annual irrepealable tax sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on the Bonds as the same becomes due as required by law.

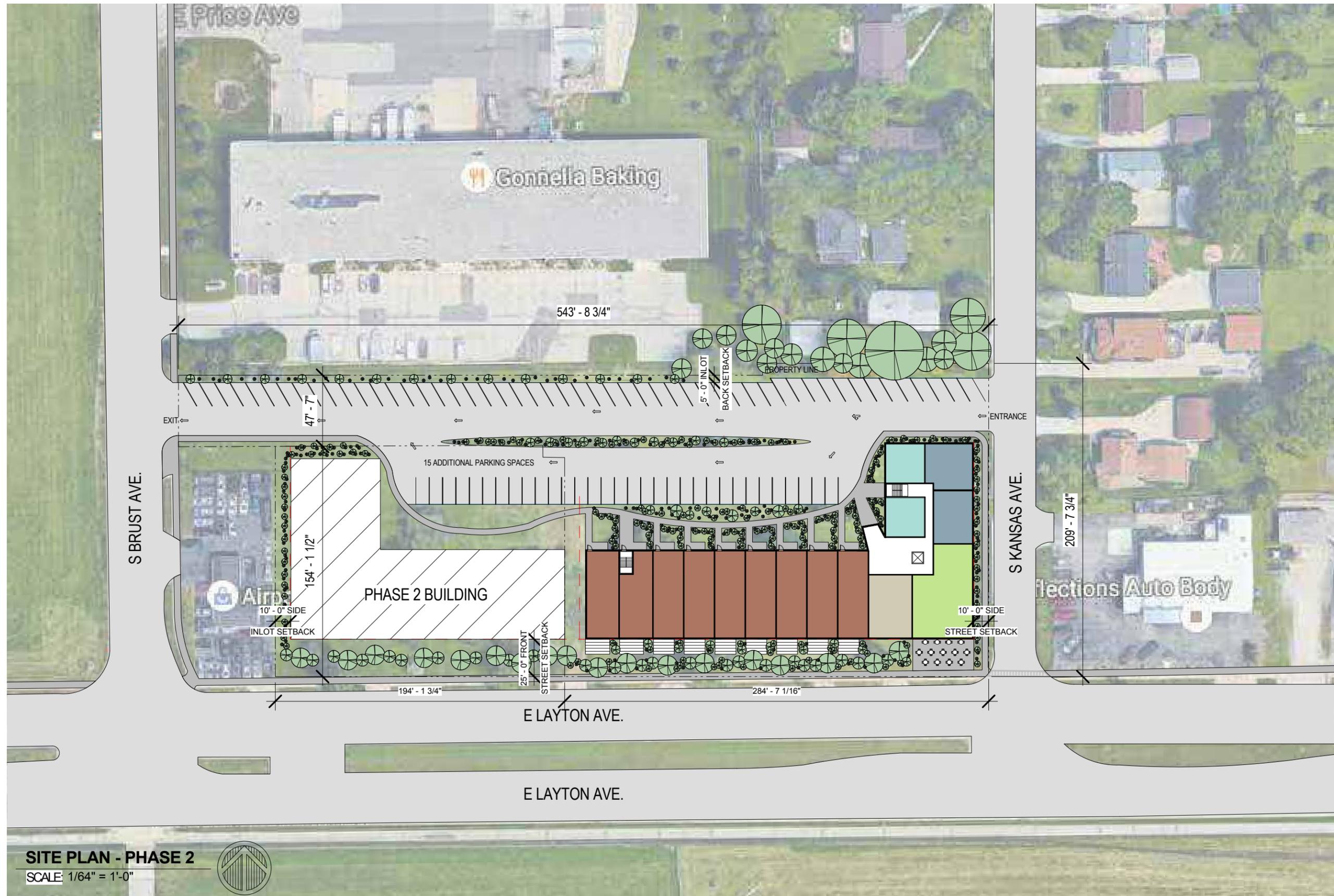

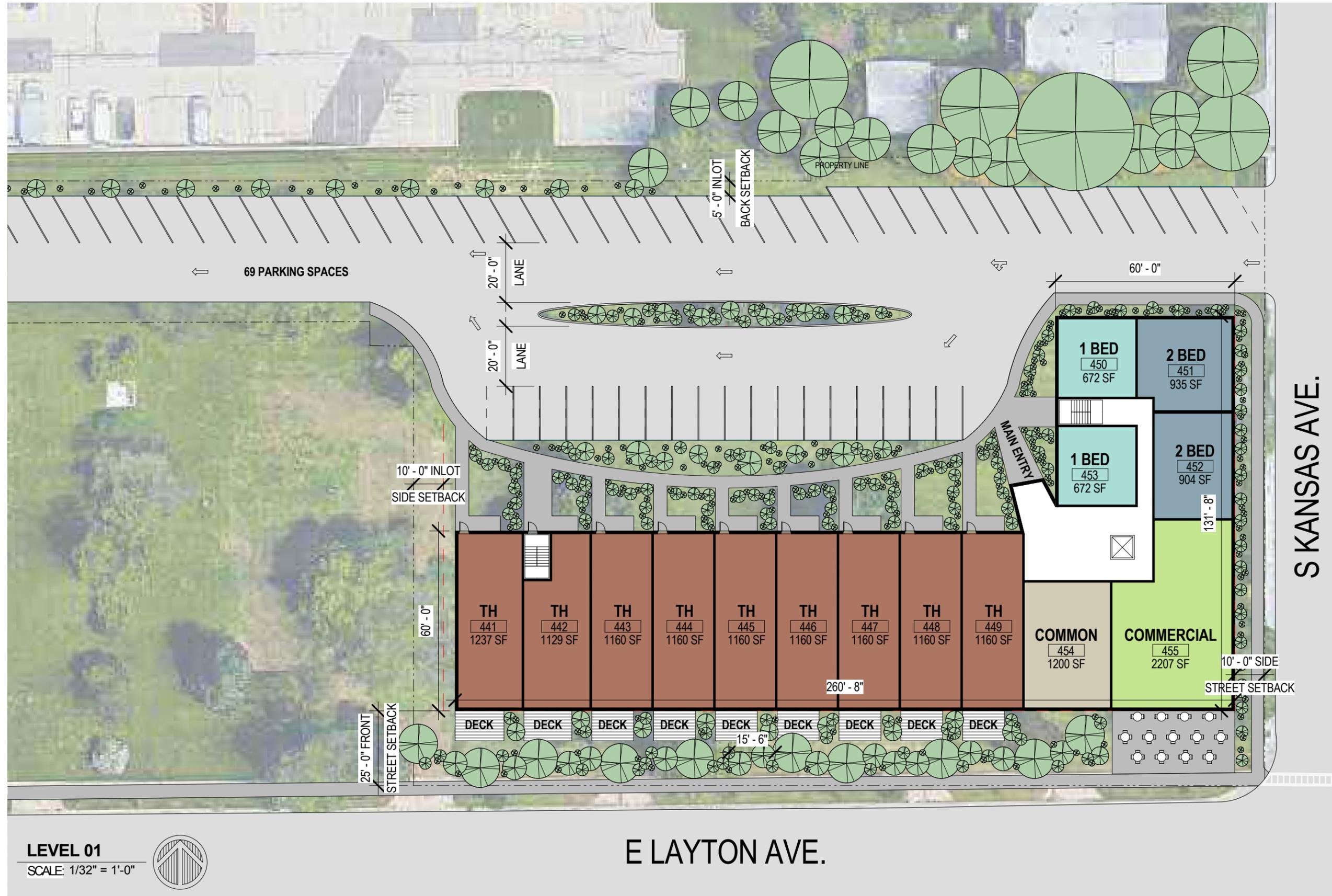

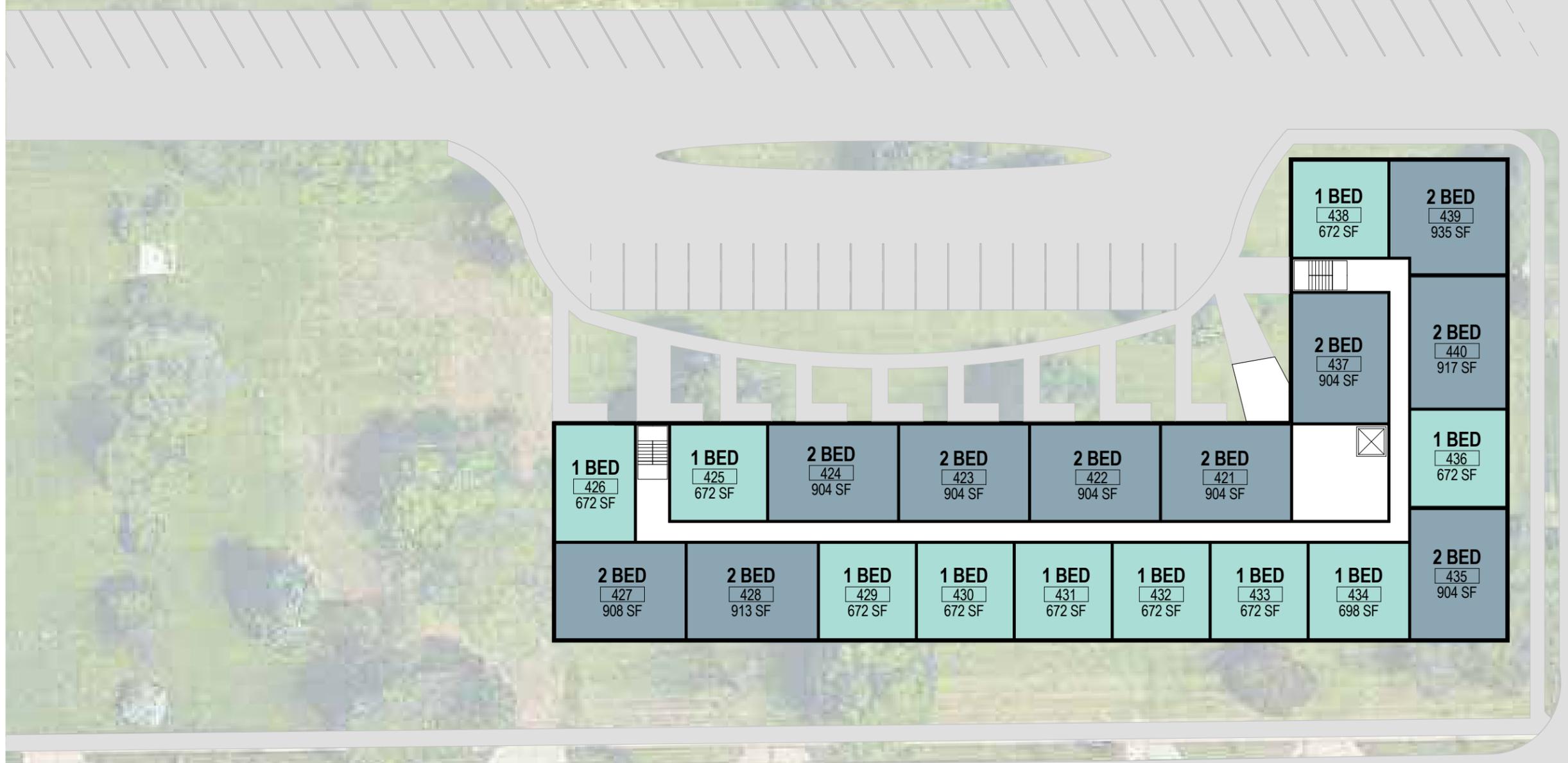

Inspiring neighborhood redevelopment

Bishop's Creek is an example of Continuum's strong commitment to enhancing urban neighborhoods with cost-effective, striking design that assists in eliminating the stigma of affordable housing. This three-story building also needed to create a presence that was equal to its large-scale industrial neighbors, yet did not overshadow the surrounding small-scale single family homes.

This was accomplished through the creative use of modern materials and a layout that helps to activate the street. In order to mimic an urban rowhouse or walk-up apartment, the three-bedroom units are located on the first floor and have cable hung balconies on the upper floors that frame the unit entry doors. This concept was carried through to the interior courtyard. Street level entries encourage neighborhood safety and pedestrian activity—essential to revitalizing any urban neighborhood. However, the units are elevated with a few steps and include garden walls for privacy.

Buildings rise to lead neighborhood redevelopment effort

This project comprises the development of new multi-family housing at the existing historical Blommer Ice Cream Company building and a new mixed-use building on the adjacent property.

Continuum assisted in securing historical tax credits for the owners, as well as WHEDA credits. Designed around a strict budget, universal housing requirements, supportive housing requirements, and historical design limitations; Continuum was able to deliver 64 mixed-income units. The development incorporates a mix of one- to four-bedroom single-level apartments, and three- to four-bedroom two-story townhomes.

Tenants have access to many amenities not normally available to affordable housing units such as a community room, individual storage, off-street parking, large unit-wide windows, a spacious lobby, and in-unit washer/dryers.

One of the biggest challenges faced was the 4' grade difference within the existing historical Blommer Building, making accessibility hard to achieve. Continuum cut a large mass out to use as a modern lobby, and modified the elevator to stop at the lower level. This grade difference also allowed for a mix of stunning, raised mezzanine units.

Neighborhood embraces its industrial past with new construction

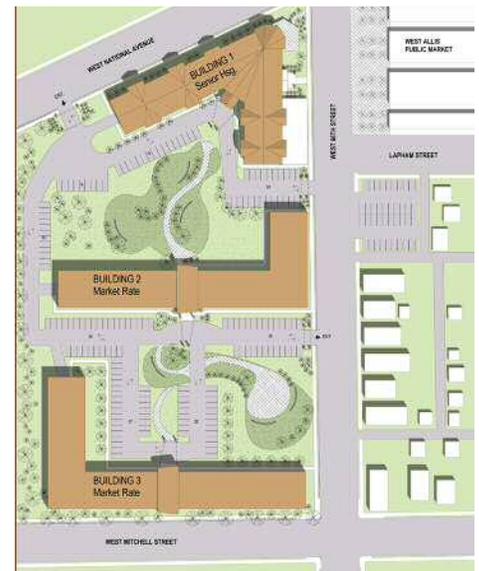
Continuum designed this bold, new, affordable apartment building on an industrial site in Walker's Point. The three-story wood structure with covered parking at grade was built over 200 piles extending 100' below grade to mitigate the marshy site, once part of Lake Michigan. The 73 units include a mixture of townhomes, one-, two-, and three-bedroom apartments. The two-story townhomes can be accessed both from the interior courtyard, and from along National Avenue.

The 'C' shaped building encloses a courtyard—outdoor green space for the residents animated by unit entries and patios. Elements such as hanging metal balconies and corrugated metal panels celebrate the industrial character of the neighborhood. The two wings of the building connect at the three-story glass tower that houses the entry lobby and all of the public/common spaces. This tower acts as a signature element for the building. When lit up at night, the entrance is a striking landmark that honors the once industrial site.

This contemporary housing incorporates Wisconsin Green Built home program elements such as an accessible green roof on the garage, and exclusive installation of LED fixtures throughout.

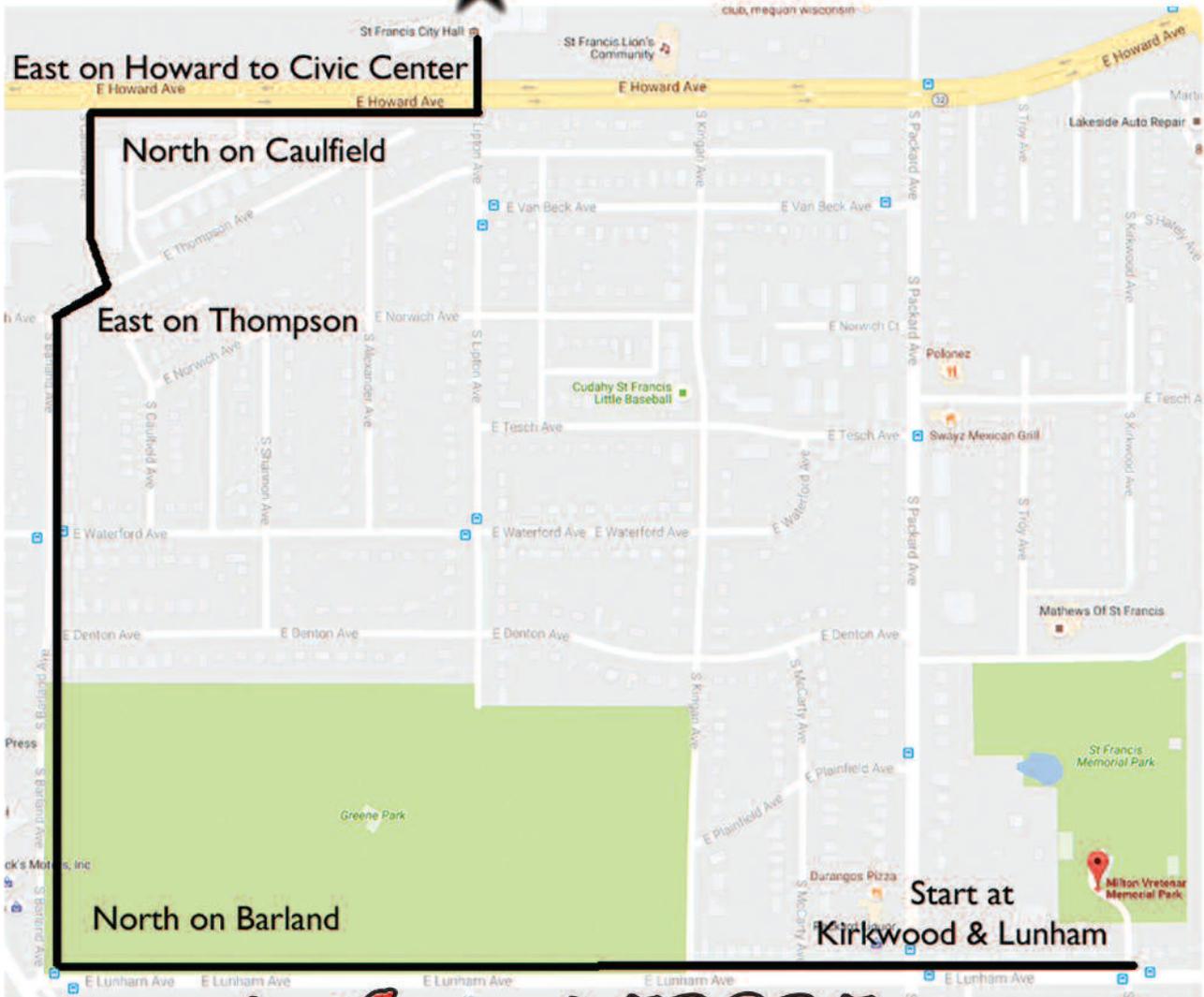

Lady and Gentlemen:

First let us introduce ourselves. We are Mariano "Skip" and Marita Schifalacqua and own the property at 3435 E. Sivyer Ave., and are presently constructing a single family home at that location. The property directly abuts the civic center complex and is located behind the fire station and parking lot.

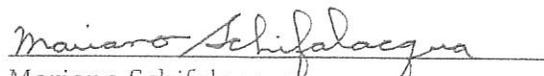
We have been working with Melinda Dejewski and Craig Vretanar regarding lighting issues between the fire station and our property and both have been very professional and helpful in addressing our issues. We thank them for their efforts and actions. In addition to lighting issues, we also are concerned about the lack of landscape screening and they suggested we write this letter.

Presently, there is no landscaping or screening along the large parking area on city property where it abuts the residential lots being developed along E. Sivyer Ave. The paved parking area is elevated and readily visible from the residential lots. The fire department routinely uses the parking area for training and storage. Recently, junk/abandoned vehicles were parked there for over a month and used for training purposes. We fully understand the need for these activities and would expect for them to continue. The activities, however, are not compatible with residential land use without the proper screening. In addition, it is our understanding that city code requires that the owner of a large parking area must provide screening landscaping when they are next to residential land use.

Based on the above facts, we are requesting the city place and maintain proper landscaping so as to create a visible screening.

Thank you for considering this request and we look forward to working with you in resolving this issue.

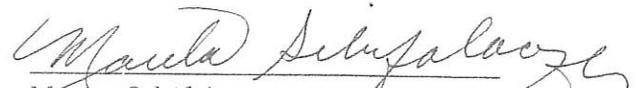

LEASE AGREEMENT

This Lease Agreement dated the 20th day of July, 2016, is by and between **GUADALUPE FLORES and ARTURO FLORES** ("Landlord"), and **JOSEFINA GUTIERREZ and CARLOS GUTIERREZ**, ("Tenants").

WITNESSETH:

Landlord hereby leases to Tenants, and Tenants hereby lease from Landlord, the Premises hereinafter described upon the terms and conditions set forth herein. 1. PREMISES

Payments shall be made to **ARTUTO FLORES AND GUADALUPE FLORES** at 3300 W. Lakefield Dr. Milwaukee, WI 53215, or at any other location specified by Landlord in writing.

4. USE OF PREMISES

Tenants covenants and agrees that during the term of this Lease Agreement, the Premises shall be used solely as warehouse for motor vehicles, trucks and motor vehicle parts. Tenants shall obtain all necessary permits, licenses and approvals, and otherwise comply with all applicable laws.

Tenants shall not sell, display or otherwise harbor any products or accessories that may be used for the consumption or use of any illegal substances.

Tenants shall not permit any practices to occur on the Premises which are unlawful or constitute a private or public nuisance. Tenants shall, at Tenants' sole cost, obtain and comply with any and all present and future permits, consents, authorizations, licenses, fees, charges and other governmental authorizations and approvals of whatever type necessary for Tenants' use of the Leased Premises permitted by this Lease Agreement.

7. INSURANCE

A. At all times during the term, Tenants shall carry and maintain, at Tenants' sole expense, the following insurance, in the amounts specified below or such other amounts as Landlord may from time to time reasonably request, with insurance companies and on forms satisfactory to Landlord:

(1) Bodily injury and property damage liability insurance, with a combined single limit of not less than \$500,000.00 on an occurrence basis. All such insurance will be equivalent to coverage offered by a commercial general liability form, including without limitation personal injury and contractual liability coverage for the performance by Tenants of the indemnity agreements set forth in Section 8 of this Lease Agreement;

(2) Insurance covering all of Tenants' interest in the improvements on the property, furniture and fixtures, machinery, equipment, stock, and any other personal property owned and used in Tenants' business and found in, on, or about the Premises, in an amount not less than the full replacement cost. insureds, and evidence of premium payment shall be delivered by Tenants to Landlord prior to the commencement of the term of this Lease Agreement, and from time to time at least ten (10) days prior to the expiration of the term of each such policy. All commercial general liability or comparable policies maintained by Tenants will name Landlord.

C. Landlord agrees to keep and maintain on the building containing the Premises a policy or policies of fire and extended coverage insurance on the Premises in the amount of the replacement value thereof.

D. Tenants waive any and all rights to recover against Landlord for any loss or damage to Tenants arising from any cause covered by any property insurance required to be carried by such party pursuant to this Section 7 or any other property insurance actually carried by such party to the extent of the limits of such policy. Tenants shall cause its respective insurers to issue appropriate waiver of subrogation rights endorsements to all property insurance policies carried in connection with the Property or the Premises or the contents of the Property of the Premises.

8. INDEMNIFICATION

A. Tenants hereby agrees to defend, indemnify and hold Landlord and agents harmless from and against any and all claims, demands, damages, judgments, liability, losses, costs and expenses, including reasonable attorney's fees, in any matter arising out of or in connection with the use of the Premises by Tenants, the breach or default on the part of Tenants in the performance of any covenant or agreement contained in this Lease Agreement, or any negligent or intentional acts or omissions of Tenants.

B. Tenants shall indemnify, defend and hold harmless Landlord and Landlord's Related Parties from any and all conditions, liabilities, damages, costs, losses, expenses and claims of every kind or nature (including, but not limited to, court costs, attorney's fees and engineering and consulting fees) that may be asserted against Landlord and Landlord's Related Parties, or that any of them may incur, relating to, arising from or attributable to (i) the use, existence, handling, generation, storage, treatment, disposal, transportation or release of any hazardous materials, substances, waste or other environmentally regulated substances (including without limitation, any materials containing asbestos, PCB's and all petroleum derivatives or distillates) on, in, at, from or under the Premises or Property, or used in connection therewith, by Tenants or Tenants' agent or (ii) the presence of such hazardous substances on the Premises or Property at any time during the Lease Term.

9. NOTICES

10. SIGNS

The Tenants understands that it will be their responsibility to purchase and install a building sign. The size, shape, construction and content of any such sign, including any alterations thereto, shall be subject to Landlord's approval. Landlord shall not unreasonably withhold approval of the Tenants' sign design or type of sign

11. LANDLORD'S INSPECTION RIGHTS

Landlord shall have the right at all reasonable times upon reasonable notice to enter upon the Premises for the purpose of inspecting same. The exercise of such right shall not be deemed an eviction or disturbance of Tenants' use or possession.

12. ALTERATIONS

A. Tenants shall accept Premises in its present condition "AS IS" and without calling upon Landlord to make any expenditures or to perform any work for the preparation of the Premises for Tenants' occupation or use.

Tenants shall, at its sole expense, make all other alterations and installations in and to the Premises necessary for Tenants' occupation and use, including, but not limited to, any changes to the existing plumbing, electrical system or partition walls necessary for Tenants' intended uses. Before commencing such alterations and installations, Tenants shall submit any plans for such alterations and installations and obtain Landlord's prior approval, such approval not to be unreasonably withheld.

B. Tenants shall indemnify and hold Landlord and Landlord's Related Parties harmless from and against any and all bills for labor performed and equipment, fixtures and materials furnished to the Tenants; from and against any and all liens, bills or claims therefore or against the Premises; and from and against any and all losses, damages, costs, expenses, suits, claims and demands, in connection with said alterations and additions.

13. MAINTENANCE AND REPAIRS

A. After occupancy, Landlord shall not be obligated to incur any expense for repairing any improvements upon the interior of the Premises or connected therewith. Tenants shall, at Tenants' own expense, keep the interior of the Premises and all improvements thereto, and all equipment, facilities and fixtures therein contained, in good order and repair (with the exception of ordinary wear and tear) and in a clean, sanitary and safe condition and in accordance with all applicable laws, ordinances and regulations of any governmental authority having jurisdiction. Tenants shall not permit the accumulation of refuse on or about the Premises nor permit any other damage or waste to the Premises.

B. As part of Tenants' obligation to keep the interior of the Premises in good repair, Tenants shall replace all broken glass with glass of the same size and quality as that broken and shall replace all damaged plumbing fixtures with fixtures of equal quality.

14. SURRENDER OF POSSESSION/ALTERATIONS

A. In the event Tenants fail to fulfill this Agreement, Tenants shall quit and surrender the Premises in good condition and repair, reasonable wear and tear excepted, and will deliver the keys at the place of payment of rent, or as directed by Landlord. Holes in the drywall shall not be considered reasonable wear and tear. Failure to surrender the Premises in good condition and repair at the expiration of the tenancy created hereunder, whether by lapse of time, default or otherwise, shall constitute a default of this Lease Agreement.

B. Tenants shall not make substantial changes, alterations, additions or improvements to the Premises without the prior written consent of Landlord. Alterations, additions or improvements on or in the Premises at the expiration of this Lease Agreement or in the event of default shall be and become a part of the Premises and shall remain upon and be surrendered with the Premises at the termination of this Lease Agreement, unless removal of same is authorized in advance in writing by Landlord. Tenants shall be liable for damages caused to the Premises by Tenants' authorized or unauthorized removal of any alterations, additions or improvements to Premises or for any damage caused by Landlord's removal of alterations, additions or improvements.

15. DAMAGE AND DESTRUCTION

If the Premises are damaged or destroyed, in whole or in part, by fire or other casualty, Landlord has the option to repair and restore the Premises to the condition that the same were in prior to the damage or destruction, or to terminate this Lease Agreement. Landlord shall exercise its option by written notice to Tenants within sixty (60) days of the date of such damage or destruction. If Landlord fails to give notice, Landlord shall be deemed to have elected to repair and restore. If Landlord elects to terminate, the Lease Agreement shall terminate effective on the date the Premises were damaged or destroyed. Monthly payment shall abate pro rata during any period beginning on the occurrence of the damage or destruction and ending when the Premises are restored or the Lease Agreement terminates pursuant to Landlord's election. Landlord has no obligation under this Lease Agreement to expend funds in repairing and restoring the Premises in excess of the Landlord's property insurance proceeds payable as a result of such damage or destruction.

16. CONDEMNATION

A. If the whole of the Premises shall be condemned by any governmental agency or political subdivision or sold to any governmental agency or political subdivision in lieu of condemnation, the term of this Lease Agreement shall cease upon the date of condemnation, monthly payments shall be paid only up to such date and Landlord shall be entitled to the award or proceeds of sale.

B. In the event of a partial condemnation or sale to any governmental agency or political subdivision in lieu of condemnation and the remaining portion of the Premises is not within the reasonable judgment of Tenants of sufficient utility to permit Tenants to carry on its business in the same manner as before the condemnation, Tenants shall so notify Landlord of that fact no later than thirty (30) days after possession of the condemned property is turned over the governmental agency or political subdivision, and this Lease Agreement shall terminate as of the date Tenants vacates the remaining portion of the Premises, and monthly payment shall be paid only up to said date and Landlord shall be entitled to the entire award or proceeds of sale. In the event Tenants do not so notify Landlord or the remaining portion of the Premises remains suitable for the carrying on of Tenants' business, Landlord shall repair or restore as nearly as possible to their condition immediately prior to the condemnation or sale in lieu thereof any portions of the improvements to the Premises affected by the condemnation or sale in lieu thereof; provided, however, that Landlord's obligation to restore is limited to the amount of the condemnation proceeds paid to Landlord.

17. UTILITIES, GARBAGE REMOVAL AND TAXES

A. Tenants shall transfer the utility and services into their name upon the date they open for business, and are responsible to pay bills when due. If any such bills are not paid when due, Landlord shall have the right to pay the same and the amounts so paid shall become additional rent and payable with the installment of base rent next due thereafter.

B. Tenants shall pay water, garbage/trash removal, outside landscape maintenance. Tenants shall pay for real estate taxes when due and furnish Landlord with a copy of a receipt for said payment by February 1st of the following year.

18. NO LIABILITY UPON LANDLORD

Landlord shall not be liable for any claims, demands, losses, costs, expenses or damage done or occasioned by or from plumbing, gas, water, sprinkler, steam or other pipes or sewerage or the bursting, leaking or running of any pipes, tanks or plumbing fixtures, in, above, upon or about the Property or Premises or any building or improvement thereon, nor for any damage occasioned by trap door or otherwise, nor for any damages arising from acts or negligence of any owners or occupants of adjacent or contiguous property.

19. DEFAULT

If any one or more of the following events shall occur:

(a) Tenants fails to pay the monthly payment or any other sum due under this Lease Agreement, and such default shall continue for sixty (60) days after notice thereof in writing by Landlord to Tenants; or

(b) Tenants defaults in the prompt and full performance of any other covenant, condition, agreement or provision of this Lease Agreement and such default shall continue for fifteen (15) days after notice thereof in writing by Landlord to Tenants, except no such notice shall be required for defaults that Landlord does not acquire

knowledge about until after Tenants' abandonment of the Premises or termination of the Lease Agreement; or

(c) Tenants abandon the Premises or the same shall become vacant or unoccupied and remain so for any period of sixty (60) consecutive days during the term of this Lease Agreement;

then in any such event of default, as herein described, Landlord may, at its option and in addition to any other remedies provided by law, and without any further demand or notice, declare this Agreement at an end, re-enter the Premises with process of law, eject all parties in possession thereof therefrom, and repossess and enjoy the Premises together with all additions, alterations and improvements thereto and Tenants shall forfeit all monies paid.

The remedies specified herein shall not limit or restrict in any manner any other remedy available to Landlord by law.

20. COMPLIANCE WITH LAWS

Tenants shall comply with all laws, regulations, ordinances and orders of federal, state, county or municipal authorities and with any direction made pursuant to law of any public offices, relating to Tenants' use of the Premises. Tenants shall not use or permit the Premises to be used or occupied for any purpose or in any manner prohibited by any applicable laws, for the use or purposes of demonstrations or picketing, or for any improper, immoral, unlawful, pornographic, sexually explicit, or objectionable use or purpose. Tenants shall not commit waste or suffer or permit waste to be committed in, on, or about the Premises.

21. CONDITION OF PREMISES

Tenants accept the Premises in "AS IS" condition, and shall return and surrender the same to Landlord after the termination of the Lease Agreement in substantially similar or better condition.

22. AGREEMENT TO SELL

The Landlord agrees that upon completion of the Term of Four(4) years three (3) months and Tenants' compliance and fulfillment of all the terms of this Agreement, they will convey the Premises to the Tenants, free and clear of all mortgages, liens and encumbrances

23. APPLICABLE LAW

This Lease Agreement shall be governed by the laws of the State of Wisconsin.

24. RIGHTS CUMULATIVE; NONWAIVER

All rights and remedies of parties stated herein shall be cumulative and none shall exclude any other rights or remedies allowed by law, and such rights and remedies may be exercised and enforced concurrently and whenever and as often as the occasion

therefore arises. No delay or omission of the exercise of any rights by either party to this Lease Agreement shall impair any such right or shall be deemed a waiver of any default.

25. COUNTERPARTS

This Lease Agreement may be executed in two or more counterparts, each of which shall be deemed an original, but all of which shall constitute one document.

26. SEVERABILITY

The invalidation of any one or more of the provisions herein shall not affect the validity of the remaining provisions herein.

27. AMENDMENT

This Lease Agreement may not be amended, except by an instrument in writing signed by all of the parties hereto.

28. SUCCESSORS

This Lease Agreement shall be binding upon, and inure to the benefit of, the parties hereto and their respective heirs, executors, administrators, legal representatives, successors and assigns.

29. ENTIRE AGREEMENT

This Agreement contains the entire agreement of the parties with respect to the subject matter hereof, and supersedes any and all written or oral negotiations, warranties, representations, agreements or other understandings in regard thereto and supersedes any and all prior Lease Agreements of the Premises to which Landlord and Tenants are a party.

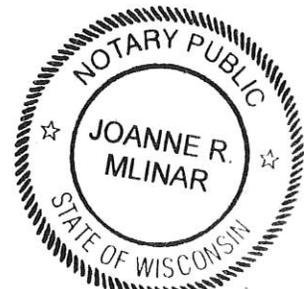
